New media, old story

Hams sometimes say that amateur radio was the original Internet. In the latest episode of The Secret History of the Future Podcast, New media, old story—the progress of radio, Tom Standage of *The Economist* and Seth Stevenson of *Slate* attempt to make that comparison. The blurb reads:



Radio was originally a social medium, as early radio sets (each of which could transmit as well as receive) turned cities into giant chatrooms, populated by Morse Code-tapping enthusiasts. But the excitement of this democratic, digital platform did not last, and radio was tamed by corporate interests in the 1920s. The utopian dream of platforms that are open and meritocratic has been reborn in the internet era in the form of blogging, and more recently podcasting. But can it ever come true?

It's not really an in-depth study, but it does make an interesting comparison between the early days of radio and the early days of the Internet. I think that one of the things that the podcast misses or deemphasizes is that ham radio really morphed into something of its own. It didn't just morph into broadcasting. By the same token, the Internet didn't just morph into an evil, completely ad-driven medium.

In this episode, they interview Dr. Susan Douglas, who is the Catherine Neafie Kellogg Professor and Arthur F. Thurnau Professor of Communication and Media here in Ann Arbor at the University of Michigan. One of the books she's written is titled, *Listening In: Radio and the American Imagination*. I'm planning on inviting her to speak to our amateur radio club.

Anthony had each Scout send their own name in Morse. Anthony in turn directed the Scouts to sit with Frank WB8YHD, and Scott KE4UHC, to try their hand on the 40M and 80M bands.

One Scout, who took our merit badge class last year, dragged his dad back to our tent 4 times so he could listen and try to talk on the radio. We think we created a new ham and we told dad he might as well get his license too. We hope to see them at a meeting soon.

All in all, it came together, and we were able to put on a great show for the Scouts and may have even created a few hams and interest in the hobby. We want to thank MVARA for supporting the effort at Stambaugh, and especially all the members who kept their radios on and were the voice on the other end. Andy WB8HYO, Andy WA8ZLK, Dave KE8KT, David KE8JTS, Fred WB8LVP, Jim KD8SNM, John KE8LJH, Ken KC8NST, Ray K8NVY, Rich KB8GAE, and Shaun KE8MOX were with us on air throughout the day.

Hamvention® Signs 5-Year Contract with Xenia Expo Center

From the The Dayton Amateur Radio Association (DARA) has signed a 5-year agreement to keep Dayton Hamvention® at the Greene County Expo Center. The agreement was announced on September 9 by Hamvention General Chairman Jack Gerbs, WB8SCT. "It has been a wonderful experience working with the Expo Center team in the development of this agreement," Gerbs said. "With the 5-year agreement signed, the Expo Center and Hamvention can move forward with additional enhancements to the facilities."

Dayton Amateur Radio Association President Ron Cramer, KD8ENJ, said the DARA Board, in approving the contract, noted that the relationship with the Expo Center and Greene County, the City of Xenia, and Xenia Township "has proven especially rewarding." Cramer said, "They all have worked hard to make Hamvention a success over the last 3 years. We look forward to a great relationship over the next 5 years and beyond." Hamvention's 2019 attendance was 32,472 - the highest recorded since the move to the Exposition Center in Xenia in 2017, which was coordinated by Cramer, the Hamvention General Chairman in 2017 and 2018.

The largest Amateur Radio show in the US, Dayton Hamvention is held the third full weekend in May. The dates for 2020 are May 15 - 17.



Station Loaner Program

If you're a new ham/newly upgraded and want to get on the HF bands, MVARA has a loaner program for club members. HAM HUMOR: FCC IS LISTENING UP

TEMECULAH, California – The Federal Communications Commission today formalized a program to assist amateur radio operators in achieving better operating practices. The "UP Monitor" program will pair each DX radio operator working "split frequency" with one official representative of the U.S. federal government.

The representative's duties are to constantly monitor the DX station's transmit frequency. If an operator – hoping to work the DX – accidentally transmits simplex, the "UP Monitor" will announce "HE'S WORKING SPLIT! HE'S WORKING SPLIT."

"We closely examined current operating procedures," says FCC Field Agent John Ranklestein.

Based at the FCC's California bureau, Ranklestein says, "We have recordings of hams who were rude, crude and downright obnoxious when someone accidentally transmitted simplex. In fact, the list of obscenities would fill a binder the size of most ham's logbooks."

Ranklestein adds the FCC opted to provide the service as a means of cleaning up the bands and eliminating crass language and QRM.

For a small fee, U.S. hams may request an "UP Monitor" be assigned when they activate special event 1×1 call signs (and operate split).

A spokesman for the National Radio Retransmission Legion (NRRL) says they support the program, but are concerned about what all the hams now performing this function as volunteers will do with their time.

"Removed from their police duties, we doubt seriously they will make actual QSOs," says the agency.

Ranklestein says the "UP Monitor" program is open to both CW and SSB DX operations, but is not available to QRP operations, since "no one can actually hear those signals anyway."
